

ABOUT THE TQSOI

The Table de Quartier Sud de l'Ouest de l'Île (TQSOI) is a non-profit community organisation that aims to improve the quality of life of the citizens of the southern West Island. With an area of about 85 km², our territory covers seven municipalities: Baie d'Urfé, Beaconsfield, Dorval, Kirkland, Pointe-Claire, Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue and Senneville.



WHAT WE DO

We facilitate round-table discussions and unite the citizens, community organizations and elected officials from all three levels of government (municipal, provincial and federal), as well as businesses and institutions. The discussions and our collaborations encourage many different voices to be heard. Individual efforts are transformed into collective action in a way that brings real change and a significant impact.

Our Social Development Process encourages the community to progress socially, culturally, economically and in a context where economic development is moving towards sustainable development in connection with principles of social justice.

WHY WE DO IT

Although the south of the West Island has a reputation for wealth and a high standard of living, there are hidden pockets of poverty and social and material deprivation that exist throughout the region. The lack of affordable housing, the difficulty accessing fresh and nutritious food and an inefficient transportation system are just some of the problems in the region. The TQSOI provides a space for citizens, community organisations and other key stakeholders who work to address these problems and who previously did not have a platform to collaborate on social development projects.






OUR COMMITTEES

In 2015, the community selected five priority issues to be addressed: Health and Social Services, Poverty Reduction & Social Inclusion, Food Security, Housing and Transportation. For each priority, a working committee was created to find solutions that would improve the quality of life of residents in the southern West Island. The Social Development Committee supports the synergy and collective work of all five committees. Participants of the committees include citizens, representatives from community organizations, public institutions, private companies and elected officials.

Each committee has a localized social development action plan, aimed at creating and instigating positive changes within the community. The Committees are working on implementing their action plans, while some are doing continuous research and planning as they move through the social development process.



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE


VISION

To support the Social Development planning process through all stages and to support the working committees.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

The Social Development Committee continued its work in aligning the activities of the TQSOI's 5 working committees. The "Six Conditions for Systems Change" is a framework that is utilized to focus on activities that can lead us to transformative changes in the community by removing systemic barriers and creating an environment for greater social development and increased quality of life for the southern West Island residents.

How does a System Change(or Resist Change)?




In order to evaluate the impact of our actions and collective efforts, the committee continues to explore a variety of evaluation models for our Social Development initiatives. Different evaluation models, tools and methodologies were tested with the participation of the members of the TQSOI's committees. This was done with a focus on the transformative changes that allow us to evaluate the impact of changing policies, practices and resource flow in the West Island community.



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The TQSOI follows the “Multi-level Evaluation Framework” which allows us to embark in evaluation activities at different levels and phases of projects and initiatives. This framework allows us to conduct evaluation of interventions that are focused on complex concepts such as the improvement of quality of life and the advancement of social development.



We have a long-standing habit of evaluating outcomes in projects and services that we coordinate, support or undertake. The theory of change, the logic model, social network mapping and outcome harvesting are among other evaluation frameworks and tools oftentimes utilized by the TQSOI to capture progress and outcomes, as well as to document learning opportunities.

Last year we introduced a new evaluation technique to the TQSOI membership - Outcome Harvesting. At the last AGM we asked our membership to indicate what changes they observed in the community and what was their contribution. We aim to continue this innovative and participatory evaluation technique in the future!



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

NEXT STEPS

The committee will continue to reflect on the next cycle of the Social Development planning in light of the current Territorial Social Development Action Plan wrapping up in the year 2021.

We will develop strategies for public consultations, citizens' forums and group discussions, with a primary focus on learning from lived experiences of people who find themselves in vulnerable situations.

We will also work on the revision of the portrait of the population of the southern West Island.



The committee will continue the development of a comprehensive Social Development Impact evaluation framework with the aim to capture the changes in the community that are triggered by the TQSOI activities.

IMPACT

- **COMMON AGENDA:** Increased number of local players adhere to the mission and actions established by working committees.
- **MUTUALLY REINFORCING ACTIVITIES:** There is an observable shift in the community towards cross-sector and multi-network collaboration. A few examples: reinforcement of the city of Pointe-Claire capacity to hear citizens' points of view during Valois pop-up event, support affordable housing development with the city of Saint-Anne-de-Bellevue, collaboration between schools and a non-profit sector for greater access to secure active means of transportation for children, and more.



FOOD SECURITY COMMITTEE

VISION

Creating access to healthy food for all residents of the West Island.



ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In October, all food security actors were invited to a meeting led by the Projet Impact Collectif (PIC) project coordinator where the West Island community was presented with a new governance model with the objective to:

- Help committee members invest their strengths in more practical or strategic actions;
- Transform TQSOI's food security committee into a hub for information on local initiatives ensuring information has a way to circulate in the West Island;
- Support three local thriving initiatives at the time: the awareness campaign led by CRC (until April 2020), the project to improve access to fresh fruits and vegetables in Pointe-Claire led by TQSOI, and the Ugly but loved and solidarity market led by Bread Basket;
- Create a support team between coordinators and directors of 3 organizations: TQSOI, CRC and Bread Basket;
- Transfer the responsibility of organizing the Food security forum in April 2020 to the TQSOI Food Security Committee.



FOOD SECURITY COMMITTEE

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

From that moment on, the committee had three motivated, dedicated and proactive co-facilitators: the TQSÔI, the CRC and Bread Basket's project coordinators. To invite the community to contribute to this new model, the coordinators created [a video](#), hosted on CRC and TQSÔI's website to simplify its explanation.

FOOD SECURITY COMMITTEE

IMPROVING ACCESS TO FRUITS AND VEGETABLES IN POINTE-CLAIRE: A RESIDENT INITIATIVE

Since 2018, the TQSOI has been working on a pilot project to increase access to fresh fruits and vegetables for residents of Pointe-Claire. Funded by the Direction Régionale de Santé Publique (DRSP), this 3-year citizen project has led to several actions since its inception. Three major steps were taken in 2019 : (1) the creation of a portrait of the situation, (2) the formation of a working group to mobilize citizens, partners and key stakeholders and (3) the development of a pilot project. Residents were directly involved in diagnosing the needs of the population and in elaborating a project for their community.

PORTRAIT OF THE SITUATION

Published in October 2019, the **“Together, Let’s Create Food Alternatives for the South West Island”** summary provides an overview of the project’s development and implementation phases.

Published in November 2019, the report of the **“Let’s Talk Food”** survey establishes a diagnosis of the community’s needs and a portrait of the existing services related to access to fresh fruits and vegetables in Pointe-Claire.

CREATE AND SUPPORT A WORKING GROUP TO MOBILIZE CITIZENS, PARTNERS AND KEY STAKEHOLDERS

A group of collaborators from partner organizations formed the Pointe-Claire project committee to develop and implement a mobilisation plan in a selected sector of Pointe-Claire -based on field observations and insights from local organizations.

For three months, this committee worked to mobilize residents in Pointe-Claire through door-to-door canvassing (383 doors), small group sessions, presentations at community meals (luncheons), emails and posters.





FOOD SECURITY COMMITTEE

DEVELOPING A PILOT PROJECT

60 residents were mobilized to select a pilot project for their community. A first citizen meeting was organized in December (held on two different nights): **41 residents** and **16 volunteers** shared a meal while envisioning potential projects for their neighborhood.



What we heard:

"I can have an impact on my community"

"C'est surtout la satisfaction que me procure l'entraide".

A second citizen meeting was held in January: **19 residents** and **7 volunteers** discussed the advantages and disadvantages of the 5 most popular initiatives identified during the first meeting. After a meal, some discussions and reflection activities, two projects were selected by the residents: a mini farmers' market and basket delivery at home.



COVID-19

The uncertainty and the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic did not stop the project from going forward. For summer 2020, a partnership was formed with Bread Basket's À-Ma-Baie Solidarity Market located in Pierrefonds to bring fresh, local and organic produce to residents in Pointe-Claire. Thanks to the Proximity Cards program led by the Carrefour alimentaire Centre-Sud, several residents will have the opportunity to use a prepaid card to purchase their fruits and vegetables. With some creativity and through phone calls and virtual meetings, the TQSOI, collaborators and residents continue to work on a pilot project to bring delicious and affordable farmers' baskets in Pointe-Claire.



FOOD SECURITY COMMITTEE

NEXT STEPS

In the next year, the Food Security Committee plans to:

- Use the tool box created by the awareness committee to promote the different tools (Hidden Hunger documentary, Food literacy guide, Workshop booklet, Food security resource guide and The West Island Food system diagnostic) to a variety of actors and through an array of platforms;
- Come up with innovative solutions to host its yearly forum within the context of a pandemic;
- Continue developing its relationship with the variety of food security actors in the West Island and strengthening its partnerships with local food banks.

IMPACT

- **RAISING AWARENESS:** By organizing activities that help promote the needs of the population in a vulnerable situation and by helping promote the existing resources around the West Island, the committee helped to raise awareness around the issue of food security and some solutions.
- **NEW AND STRENGTHENED PARTNERSHIPS:** The PIC project helped create stronger and more collaborative relationships around food security in the West Island, especially through the collective work of the TQSOI, the CRC and Bread Basket's project coordinators.
- **COMMUNITY SUPPORT:** By staying informed on at least three local food security projects on a monthly basis, the committee became a space for the community to offer and receive support, exchange resources and stay informed.
- **INCREASED CAPACITY:** Through mobilization efforts, the Food Security Committee welcomed new members who represent themselves as citizens, political parties and community organizations



HOUSING COMMITTEE

VISION

Adequate and appropriate affordable housing responding to the needs of citizens in the southern West Island in the next 50 years.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

This year the Housing Committee took several occasions to engage with municipal representatives and make the case for affordable housing. Whether it be Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue, Pointe-Claire or Dorval, the needs and opportunities for affordable housing were presented and discussed. With Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue's plans for a seniors' village on the Anciens-Combattants site, the committee has been involved in the inclusion of a community housing project within this development. The committee partnered with a technical resource group in order to help move forward this exciting project and continues to do so! The committee also engaged with the public when the TQSOI hosted the Valois Village Community Pop-Up event in August 2019. The event included a whole kiosk devoted to exploring the idea of affordable housing with residents, the results of which were shared with the Pointe-Claire Urban Planning Department.


COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic, combined with the preexisting housing crisis, created a situation of precariousness for many West Island residents. Their housing needs and concerns needed to be addressed. However, the West Island does not have a tenant's rights and support organization, known as a *comité logement*.

The Comité logement St-Laurent temporarily stepped in to fill the gap in this service. The CRC and the TQSOI came together to share this service with the community in several ways. A flyer was created and posted on social media and it was also printed with over 1000 copies distributed. The flyer was also shared with local elected officials, including mayors, city councillors, MNAs and MPs. Preliminary plans to establish a comité logement in the West Island are being developed.



HOUSING COMMITTEE



Internally, committee members sought to develop their own expertise on community housing by planning and going on housing tours. **The committee visited a total of eight community housing projects**; among them, projects dedicated to families, senior and mental health clientele. Through these tours, committee members were able to learn first hand about the resourcefulness and leadership of the citizens and communities who came together to create housing for those in need. The housing tour model was granted funding by the Société d'habitation du Québec in late 2019. With this funding, these Housing Tours would be open to local stakeholders with the main goal to share knowledge about community housing in order to overcome the stigma associated with it. The planning of these tours began in early 2020 and are ongoing!

NEXT STEPS

The Housing Committee is committed to continuing to explore and create opportunities for partnership and collaboration. This is essential in order to create a broad and sustainable mobilization movement for affordable housing.

With this in mind, the committee plans to:

- Reach out and empower those in need to mobilize and develop actions for adequate and appropriate housing for all West Island residents, particularly vulnerable groups;
- Create resources to support the population in need of housing;
- Find new ways to mobilize political commitment to address the lack of affordable housing in the West Island;
- Continue to develop its own expertise and provide opportunities for networking for informed decision-making in developing housing opportunities and policy.



HOUSING COMMITTEE



IMPACT

- **SECURING OPPORTUNITIES:** Whether it be the inclusion of a community housing project in the Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue development or supporting the services of a comité logement in the West Island, the committee went above and beyond to connect with organizations and local partners to seize these opportunities and develop plans to take them to the next level.
- **KNOWLEDGE BUILDING:** The committee's community housing tours have equipped members with first-hand knowledge on how housing projects are initiated, their development process, and how they are managed. This wealth of knowledge will help them better advocate for more community housing in the West Island.
- **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:** The Valois Village Pop-Up engaged local residents to think about their and their community's housing needs. The housing kiosk brought them to discover the different types of housing that could be integrated into their neighbourhood and encouraged them to work together towards solutions.
- **POLITICAL AWARENESS:** With its housing needs assessments and proposals in hand, the Committee secured meetings with elected officials to discuss their constituents' needs and the different ways to address them.



HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

VISION

Improved and timely access to health and social services for citizens in the southern West Island.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The committee members continue to deliver the voices of the West Island community via the representation at the variety of strategic and action committees that are coordinated by the West Island CIUSSS:



This year, we also have an addition, a representation at the regional level:

- Comité régional pour les programmes d'accès pour les services de santé et de services sociaux en langue anglaise

We are happy to have a constant presence of our local health authorities at our committee meetings. This allows us to efficiently communicate and deliver important information about health and social services directly from our committee members as well as from West Island residents.

At one of our membership meetings, the committee members made a presentation to the community demystifying the legislation that regulates the right to access to Health and Social Services in English.





HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

With the aim to learn from the lived experience of health service users, the committee welcomed a citizen guest speaker who brought to the surface certain challenges that socially isolated seniors are facing in the West Island long term care residences. Specifically, the lack of access to free Wi-Fi connection severely impacts their quality of life by depriving them of the technology to connect them to their loved ones. The committee also identified other obstacles related to access to technology – access to computers, access technical assistance and knowledge acquisition. It is our intention to continue to work in collaboration with our health authorities to further explore these challenges and develop solutions.

NEXT STEPS

- Analyze the chart of the WI CIUSSS projects and committees and identify opportunities for collaboration;
- Further collaborate with health authorities and other key stakeholders to secure access to technology for isolated seniors in CHSLDs;
- Maintain the consistent presence of CIUSSS authorities at committee meetings;
- Explore existing or upcoming CIUSSS projects that require community feedback;
- Identify CIUSSS areas of priority and provide our input.

IMPACT

- **COLLABORATION AND PARTNERSHIP:** Strengthening potential for collaboration between multi-sectoral stakeholders – health institutions, nonprofits and citizens.
- **CONTINUOUS COMMUNICATION:** Constant presence of health authorities at TQSOI meetings as well as the presence of our health committee members at the West Island CIUSSS committees increases the quality and efficiency of the flow of communication.
- **GIVING CITIZENS A VOICE:** Assure representation of lived experience by including citizens in the committee and inviting them as guest speakers to the meetings.
- **INSTITUTIONAL AND STRUCTURAL INFLUENCE:** Committee members continue to influence practices and processes through participation and representation at the committees coordinated by the WI and regional health authorities.



POVERTY REDUCTION & SOCIAL INCLUSION COMMITTEE

VISION

Improve the quality of life of disadvantaged individuals and groups in the southern West Island.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

In the Fall of 2019, a new food security governance model was introduced to the TQSOI community. With this restructuring, some Poverty Reduction and Social Inclusion committee members who had participated in the “Let’s Talk Food” survey and the “Make the Invisible Visible” campaign felt their calling belonged elsewhere. Around the same time, the TQSOI hired a new coordinator to facilitate the committee, and with the help of its existing members and TQSOI’s network, the committee welcomed 6 new members. These new members came with diverse community backgrounds and their motivation helped energize the committee. The committee also welcomed a new co-facilitator from the West Island community. Overall, in 2019-2020, the committee had 19 members among which 15 were active!



In early 2020, committee members reviewed their Action Plan in light of last year's accomplishments and aspirations - it was time for the committee to give itself a clear mission and a unique purpose. Members chose to invest in identifying the gaps in services offered to vulnerable people in the West Island and help close these gaps. Brainstorming activities were organized around this new objective.



POVERTY REDUCTION & SOCIAL INCLUSION COMMITTEE

At the same time, the TQSOI team pursued some unfinished objectives from the previous year (2018-19) related to poverty reduction and social inclusion:

- To encourage citizen participation in decision making and collect their opinions, including those of disadvantaged individuals and groups, the committee played a central role in the brainstorming and implementation of strategies for a variety of the TQSOI's activities. This includes the 2019 federal election "Meet Your Candidates", the Food Security Citizen's Project, the Valois Village Pop-up, and more.
- To help sensitize the community to the realities of disadvantaged individuals in the West Island, the TQSOI led an awareness conference at a Pointe-Claire seniors' residence.

COMMITTEE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The "Love Your Neighbours" Initiative

The committee also became a strong ally in the development, implementation and promotion of a local initiative: the "Love Your Neighbours" project. Led by the West Island Network, this initiative targets hidden poverty by encouraging relationships between neighbours. This collaboration became central as a worldwide pandemic reached the West Island in March 2020.

The West Island Network and TQSOI collaborated closely to help alleviate poverty and vulnerable situations in the West Island with the following actions: the early launch of the "Love Your Neighbours" project through a Facebook page. Mobilizing community

actors to moderate a hub for mutual aid through the Facebook group: "JMV | LYN West Island COVID-19 Response". Creating a "Top 10 ways to love your West Island Neighbours during COVID-19" list of action items with a wide range of community and religious actors in the West Island.

Top 10 Ways to Love Your West Island Neighbours During COVID-19

For All
If You're Not in a Vulnerable Situation (Sick, 70+, Immunocompromised, etc.)
Make a list of family, friends and neighbours (especially those who are vulnerable or struggle with mental health) to call or video conference regularly. Stay connected.
Give your phone number and offer support, like grocery and medication pick up, to your neighbours in a vulnerable situation.
Put a 'Love Your Neighbours' sign in your window to let your neighbours know that you're there for them.
Pray for your neighbours or send them positives vibes or thoughts.
Volunteer with local community organizations and give blood.
Think of fun and creative ways to connect, like online movie watching or dinners over video conference.
Consider your gifts and talents and how you could share them online (example: teach, play music, exercise, etc.).
Put a heart or rainbow on your door or window to spread love and encouragement.
Play live music outside and speak to your neighbours from a distance.
Lend access to technology or items you own to a neighbour who may need (sanitize first!).

POVERTY REDUCTION & SOCIAL INCLUSION COMMITTEE

NEXT STEPS

In the next year, the Poverty Reduction and Social Inclusion Committee plans to:

- Define an action plan to identify the gaps in services offered to vulnerable people in the West Island, specifically building tools to measure these gaps and identifying key actors to survey;
- Define an action plan to help close the identified gaps in services offered to vulnerable people in the West Island. This includes working closely with community organizations to build knowledge and opportunities;
- Support the “Love Your Neighbours” project through its promotion and expansion phases;
- Continue to engage local communities through new community and citizen based initiatives, such as a COVID-19 needs assessment and other related projects.

IMPACT

- **HIGHLIGHTING RESIDENTS’ POINTS OF VIEW:** New and improved practices to collect diverse points of view from residents of the southern West Island. Multiple occasions to hear what these residents have to say on how to improve their quality of life.
- **NEW AND STRENGTHENED PARTNERSHIPS:** The West Island Network project coordinator took on the role of committee co-facilitator. The committee collaborated with the West Island Network’s Community Action and Impact Team to develop and launch the “Love Your Neighbours” project.
- **COMMUNITY SUPPORT:** The creation and moderation of a Facebook group as a platform for mutual aid.
- **INCREASED CAPACITY:** As a result of mobilization efforts, the Poverty Reduction and Social Inclusion Committee has new members who represent themselves as citizens, political parties and community organizations.



TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

VISION

A well-integrated transportation system that meets the needs of different road users and facilitates connectedness between different modes of transportation.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

In April 2019, the Transportation Committee decided to focus on local, small-scale initiatives. In light of the new Valois Village Code, the TQSOI conducted a participatory assessment of active transportation in Valois Village. In order to collect citizens' viewpoints, we distributed a community survey to Valois residents both online and in-person and received a total of 38 responses. We also participated in an exploratory walk with Pointe-Claire planners and Valois residents and documented the discussions. This provided us with insights into the realities and needs of residents with regards to their mobility in the Village.

During our Community Pop-Up event in August, local residents, many of them children, participated in our "Complete Streets" activity and contributed their visions for the revitalization of Donegani Avenue. In March 2020, we published the Valois Village Transportation Assessment: Active Modes of Transportation on our website. Thanks to these initiatives, we established many new connections with Pointe-Claire City Councillors, the Planning Department, and other key organizations.

The Active Schools working group was created in partnership with CIUSSS de l'Ouest-de-l'Île-de-Montréal and VertCité.



Its main objectives were to encourage elementary school students to use active means of transportation and help schools improve road safety in school zones. We promoted existing programs, such as Vélo Québec's School Travel Plan and Urban Explorers, as well as the Canadian Cancer Society's Trottibus. We reached out to 13 primary schools in our territory, 3 of these have registered to Vélo Québec's programs! Plans are currently being developed for École Émile-Nelligan with the City of Kirkland, as well as Écoles Pointe-Claire and Margeurite-Bourgeois for the City of Pointe-Claire.



TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

NEXT STEPS

Having achieved incredible success this year, the Transportation Committee will continue to provide support for local, small-scale projects in the future. The members also acknowledged the need for greater participation of different stakeholders to generate meaningful impacts. In the next year, the Transportation Committee plans to:

- Strengthen collaboration with our community partners to promote active and alternative modes of transportation in the West Island;
- Recruit enthusiastic members and expand the representation in the committee;
- Establish new relationships with important actors in transportation;
- Enhance the success of our current initiatives;
- Exert additional influence on the implementation of the Valois Village Code;
- Continue to engage local communities through new community-based initiatives.

IMPACT

- **NEW AND STRENGTHENED PARTNERSHIPS:** As a result of our Active Schools initiative, we established new partnerships with the school communities and strengthened our existing partnerships with CIUSSS and VertCit . We also connected with several other organizations that share the same motivation for promoting safe and active transportation.
- **CITIZEN EDUCATION:** Due to our mobilization efforts, three primary schools and over one hundred students will receive road safety training from V lo Quebec.
- **POLICY INFLUENCE:** We presented key findings from the Transportation Assessment to Pointe-Claire urban planners and elected officials and received positive feedback.
- **KNOWLEDGE BUILDING:** The Valois Village Transportation Assessment contributed to our knowledge base of the conditions pedestrians and cyclists are faced with in the Valois Village. This information will help us initiate projects addressing the needs of the local community.
- **INCREASED CAPACITY:** The transportation committee welcomed four new members who represent citizens, public agencies, and other NGOs.

THE TQSOI AT WORK



THE COLLECTIVE IMPACT PROJECT (PIC)



The PIC project is facilitated by the CRC in collaboration with the TQSOI as the project leader. Funded by Centraide of Greater Montreal, the project has been bringing community partners together to accelerate change in the fight against poverty since 2016. The overall approach to the project is developed collectively - from its inception to its implementation and evaluation. The project is a two part or "double-spiraled" approach - learning to work together (Part 1) by developing structured collective projects (Part 2). The five-year project has just completed the third year.

Part 1: Learning to work together

Our objectives:

1. Improve our efficiency collectively
2. Facilitate opportunities for collective capacity building
3. Create opportunities and support initiatives for collective action

Major achievements 2019 - 2020

a) Supporting implementation and collective efforts with the following groups:

- Table Enfance Famille Jeunesse Ouest-de-l'Île
- Services planning in the youth sector
- West Island Mental Health Table
- Table DI-TSA déficience intellectuelle (DI) et en trouble du spectre de l'autisme (TSA)
- Ma communauté en santé
- Comité de pilotage de développement social de l'Ouest-de-l'Île
- The TQSOI Food Security and Housing committees

b) Representing the community sector at the Conseil des Partenaires of the West Island CIUSSS and at PME Montreal.

c) Engaging in the following research projects:

- Assessment of the collaboration between the different food security actors in the West Island, in collaboration with McGill Fledge project;
- Creation of a West Island food system needs diagnosis in collaboration with Dawson College Food Justice & Sustainability.

d) Assessing the training needs of West Island community organizations and offering training sessions within the community sector on the following topics:

- Appreciative inquiry
- Principle-focused evaluation
- Systemic approach to collaboration
- Conflict management

e) Launching the Hub website

Multiple committees have entered their data into the website with a user guide in French and English. Multiple training sessions were offered and ongoing upgrading and adaptations are being made to better serve the needs expressed.

f) Implementing a new collective governance system for food security

Focused on a combination of knowledge and shared leadership, a governance model was developed that is flexible, while ensuring the long term viability of the model in the West Island. Expertise on food security and citizen mobilization came from Bread Basket and the TQSOI, with the CRC facilitating the collaboration process. Food security governance has been established and continues to evolve during the COVID-19 crisis. Meetings continue to be held between partners in food security and we are documenting the evolution of the governance model.

THE COLLECTIVE IMPACT PROJECT (PIC)

Part 2: Developing structured collective projects

Food Security: The food security awareness campaign in the West Island

Our objectives:

1. Raising awareness about the issues and promoting the resources related to food insecurity available in the West Island
2. Develop and promote tools and resources regarding food literacy
3. Promote the engagement of public officials with regards to food security

Major achievements 2019 - 2020

- Participants in the panel on food security decided to focus on food security awareness in municipalities, schools and with the public.
- The following tools and reports were created:
 - Report on food security awareness
 - Food literacy guide in French and English
 - Document highlighting food security workshops in the West Island

Communication plan to be initiated once the COVID-19 crisis subsides, including a tool box that offers a description and suggested use for the developed awareness tools.

Housing Affordability: Create innovative and feasible solutions for affordable and community housing by bringing key local players together

Our objectives:

1. Assess and map the current housing situation throughout the West Island
2. Confirm commitment of key players to coming up with solutions
3. Learning together through collaboration

Major achievements 2019-2020

- A) Enhancing existing data and mapping of the West Island housing situation
- B) Documenting key players involved in housing in the West Island
- C) Developing the action plan for the Housing Social Innovation Lab and outlining the next steps



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT ACROSS THE WEST ISLAND

MISSION

Establishment of a co-creation process - “Towards a new model of social development for the West Island territory”.

THE STEERING COMMITTEE

To breathe fresh air into the West Island’s collaborative process, a steering committee was created on July 31st, 2019, with the mandate to undertake an innovative, creative and inclusive approach to identify a new social development model for the territory – one that takes into account the community and territorial specificities of both the North and the South of the West Island. This approach ensures the representativeness of these areas and nourishes the co-creation of a shared vision for the social development of the West Island.

The TQSOI has been actively involved in the work of the committee since its inception. Our human resources have been dedicated to participating fully in the committees meetings and in sub-committees, this includes taking on tasks in order to ensure the dossier moves forward.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Ensuring the process is adequately funded
- Planning and co-design of the consultation process
- Communication of the mandate to funders

NEXT STEPS

- Communicating the mandate with TQSOI members and the entire West Island community;
- Prototyping a collaborative dossier;
- Consultation meetings (remote);
- Survey of actors;
- Making collective choices with regards to the concertation model to be adopted by stakeholders (guidelines, structure, governance, processes, roles, etc.).

EVENTS

VOTING POP-UPS


We set up the Pop-Up at Pointe-Claire Plaza’s Community Awareness Day (September 7), John Abbott College (October 1-2) and the West Island YMCA (October 15). Participants were asked to participate in a mock vote, by selecting the socio-economic issue that thought was most important in the context of the upcoming election.

The options were based on the TQSOI’s priorities as well as issues that played a central role in the federal campaign. They were: food security, affordable housing, eco-friendly transportation, climate change and poverty reduction.

In total, 234 people participated in our Vote Pop-Ups. At the Pointe-Claire Plaza and the YMCA we had 45 and 42 people, respectively. At John Abbott College we had 147 people over 2 days.

MEET-MY-CANDIDATE EVENT

On October 8th, the TQSOI hosted five federal candidates in the riding of Lac-Saint-Louis for a “Q & A” session at Beaurepaire United Church in Beaconsfield. The candidates had the opportunity to present themselves to the community and answer questions that had been posed in advance. The TQSOI team (Shannon, Camille, Alena & Anne-Cécile) was helped by volunteers Leslie and Ghassan. Anne-Marie moderated the evening. The space was rented to us through Jane Cowell, an administrator at the church and help was provided by the Minister Ryan Fea.



EVENTS

VALOIS VILLAGE POP-UP

On August 14th, 2019 the TQSOI hosted the Valois Village Community Pop-Up. The purpose of the event was to gather feedback on three key priorities: increasing affordable housing stock, addressing food security issues and improving road sharing for safer active transportation.

The event was organized in response to a 2017 Special Planning Program (SPP) for the Valois Village adopted by the City of Pointe-Claire based on community discussions and consultations. The SPP details the urban planning of a given area and its objectives the “creation of a friendly and vibrant living environment, which is accessible and safe, the development of a visual identity unique to the area and the consolidation of the Village as a local commercial destination.”



The Valois Village Community Pop-Up was designed to reach out to the Valois community using a “bottom-up” planning approach to offer a grassroots perspective on food security, active transportation and housing. The event took place outside of the TQSOI headquarters and attracted approximately 125 people, most of whom live in or close to Valois Village.

EARTH DAY 2020 CELEBRATION

The TQSOI celebrated Earth Day with an online bird crafting contest. The goal was to raise awareness about the biodiversity of birds in the West Island and the importance of conserving their habitat. Participants were asked to pick a bird to craft from a list of birds found in the Technoparc, a unique and rich habitat under threat of development. An educational package was also provided. We received 17 wonderful submissions! Three winners were gifted two pairs of binoculars, a bird feeder, and a gift certificate to Le Nichoir.



COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

FACEBOOK



We use our [Facebook page](#) to promote our activities, the activities of our community partners, and news items related to our dossiers to inspire the community. Over the past year, our page received over 200 likes, bringing us to a total of 630 page likes! We posted over 250 times, with our top posts reaching 1.9 and 4.3 thousand people.

In order to demystify certain concepts related to our dossiers, we started a Facebook series with short and accessible posts to raise awareness and inform our followers on these topics. In March, we kicked things off with transportation and different types of traffic calming measures. A different type of measure was featured every day for a week - speed bumps, traffic circles, curb extensions and chicanes. These posts included details on their implementation cost, their comparative effectiveness, and their advantages and disadvantages. We reached a total of 1.7K people with these Facebook posts and plan to continue the series for our other dossiers in the near future.



NEWSLETTER

We continue to use Mailchimp to send out a monthly newsletter to our members with updates regarding the TQSOI's activities, PIC activities and news from our members. This year we sent out a total of 28 emails, including our newsletter and emails with information about membership meetings and major projects such as the Valois Village Community Pop-Up and the Meet-My-Candidates event. We now have 235 regular subscribers.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

COVID-19

Communications took on a new importance when COVID-19 hit our region. Early on, we sought to reassure the community by providing up-to-date and accurate information from reliable sources (government, institutions, local front-line organizations, and more). As things were changing at a rapid pace, we did our best to keep up with local emerging opportunities and needs in order to share these far and wide. Our goal was to highlight the importance of the work being done and promote opportunities for collaboration. The increased level and pace of communication through the pandemic was a challenge but we worked hard to adapt and have learned valuable lessons. Since the beginning of the pandemic, community organizations have rolled up their sleeves to multiply the services they offer and have found innovative ways to support their community like never before.






COMMUNICATIONS REPORT


COVID-19 WEBSITE TAB

EVALUATION AND CONFORMITY FEEDBACK

Each year, all Table de Quartiers submit their reports to the Initiative montréalaise du soutien au développement social local, which conducts a summary evaluation and compliance analysis. We are proud to share that the TQSOI has received perfect ratings for all evaluation criteria. The evaluation committee found that the TQSOI has a sound management of funds and has a very good command of all the criteria of the Terms of Reference.
