


By reading the activity report you will see that we have completed an impressive number of activities. Together we have done a great job improving people's living conditions, which gives meaning to our existence as an organization.





OUR COMMITTEES

In 2015, the community selected five priority issues to be addressed: Health and Social Services, Poverty Reduction & Social Inclusion, Food Security, Housing and Transportation. For each priority, a working committee was created to find solutions that would improve the quality of life of residents in the southern West Island. The Social Development Committee supports the synergy and collective work of all five committees. Participants of the committees include citizens, representatives from community organizations, public institutions, private companies and elected officials.

Each committee has a localized social development action plan, aimed at creating and instigating positive changes within the community. The Committees are working on implementing their action plans, while some are doing continuous research and planning as they move through the social development process.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS


Since June 2019, the TQSOI has been actively involved in the work of the West Island steering committee in order to develop a new concertation mechanism dedicated to the social development of the territory.

In light of the ongoing pandemic, and due to a greater focus on the work of the West Island steering committee, the TQSOI Social Development Committee had to put on hold many of its planned activities.

LOOKING FORWARD

In the coming year, the committee is planning to undertake activities to evaluate the impact of the first social development action plan. The committee is also aiming to start a new territorial strategic planning.

The TQSOI will continue offering its support to the West Island Social Development steering committee.



IMPACT

- **COLLETIVE ACTION:** Continued alignment of activities between various projects and committees.
- **SUPPORTING HARMONIOUS ACTIVITY:** The TQSOI continues to play a pivotal role to ensure that West Island wide social development activities are aligned and coordinated with local initiatives.
- **EXPLORING ALTERNATIVES:** The TQSOI actively contributes to the development of alternative solutions to a more comprehensive social development model for the whole West Island.
- **COLLABORATION & PARTNERSHIP**: We connected and partnered with key stakeholders in the northern West Island, contributed to the development and supported their projects.




VISION

Creating access to healthy food for all residents of the West Island.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2020, the food security community was turned upside down by the pandemic, which led the TQSOI to focus on certain essential actions to respond to the crisis - see the COVID-19 section below for more details.

The activity of the food security committee slowed down indeed during the first months of the pandemic, to finish 2020 with strength as we welcomed new members and did an overview of the various initiatives supported by the committee. The meetings were then focused on the accomplishments of the committee since 2016, with regard to the action plan. In addition, the TQSOI and Bread Basket renewed their partnership to facilitate the committee together.





IMPROVING ACCESS TO FRESH FRUITS AND VEGETABLES IN POINTE-CLAIRE

Thanks to funding from the Direction régionale de santé publique (DRSP) and the support of its local partners, the TQSOI is pleased to coordinate a project that aims at improving access, both physical and economic, to fresh fruits and vegetables in Pointe-Claire. It is the residents who live in the heart of the municipality, who are at the center of this project.

After the concertation process with local residents (2019-2020), a pilot project of fruits and vegetables distribution was planned and implemented during the summer of 2020. It is the result of a collaboration between the TQSOI, Bread Basket, West Island farms, the Proximity card program of the Carrefour alimentaire center-sud, residents of Pointe-Claire, the city of Pointe-Claire and Office Municipale d'Habitation (OMH).

This system has been designed in an inclusive, accessible and sustainable way. It included two types of distributions where orders were either taken and prepared in advance (COVID-19 friendly!) or participants could shop at a "mini-market".

Participants were also able to benefit from the Proximity Cards program to make their purchases; a card with a monthly amount of \$ 25 to \$ 100 (depending on the size of the household). Seven distributions were organized between July and October, totalling 168 baskets, 55 participants, with the support of 9 volunteers.


FOOD SECURITY INTERVENTION CELL

The Food Security Intervention Cell, created in April 2020 by the TQSOI, is a space for all West Island food security stakeholders and their allies (municipalities, boroughs, community organizations and institutions) to: share real-time information, work together, help each other out and develop initiatives to meet the urgent needs of the population and front-line organizations facing pandemic emergencies. Each meeting brings together about fifteen organizations and changing actors.

The Cell allows, among other things, the sharing of resources and useful contacts, the sharing of opportunities (funding, volunteers, equipment, etc.) and ad hoc assistance in response to urgent situations (surplus of food, lack of resources, organization of events, tool development, etc.).

COMMUNITY INITIATIVES


The Food Security Intervention cell, the multiple emerging and strengthened collaborations within the West Island community and the growing needs, led to TQSOI mobilization around a plurality of initiatives - both as an instigator and a project leader or by offering support around fruitful collaborations. Here are some examples of community initiatives put in place to address growing food insecurity and support our local food banks during the pandemic:

- Collaboration around the organization of two food drives (April August 2020) to the benefit of West Island Food banks.
- Support for the "Miracle of March 13" and "Miracle of September 13" food drives.





- Collaborative development of a guide to prevent food insecurity and provide resources to residents of the West Island.
- Collaboration around the organization of an event for the distribution of hot meals "Food truck" style, in a context of physical distancing.
- Collaborative development of guides of "good practices for professionals".
 - How to prevent and respond to the closure of my organization?
 - How do I refer clients in quarantine for troubleshooting food resources?
- Funding support for multiple organizations working in food security in the West Island, in collaboration with Centraide.
- Support for the development of a grocery delivery system, when businesses could no longer meet demand.
- Organization of the West Island Food Bank Meeting, a virtual event where 3 banks shared information with an audience representing 20 organizations, municiplaties and churches.





LOOKING FORWARD

As a new year is upon us, the Food Security Committee wishes to complete the promotion of the awarness tools developed under the PIC project and *Are You Hungry*? awarness campaign. Some of these tools have not reached their full potential and a variety of audiences. Therefore, the committee makes it its main objective for the coming year.



That being said, the pandemic is not behind us and the initiatives presented before are still relevant today. In parallel to the committee's efforts to continue to raise awareness with elected officials, the community and residents, when it comes to food insecurity, we will continue to nurture spaces for consultation and networking – such as the Food Security Intervention Cell. We will also continue our efforts to support local organizations and initiatives.

As for our project in Pointe-Claire, aiming to improve access to fresh fruits and vegetables, we will take on the challenge of building from scratch, with key partners, a local public market in the heart of the municipality.

IMPACT

- **COLLABORATION & PARTNERSHIP:** We connected and partnered with key food security stakeholders.
- MORE RESOURCES, MOBILIZED FUNDING: Food security challenges in the West Island became more evident during the pandemic. We assured the flow of financial aid as well as donations to the local food banks.
- **SUPPORTING HARMONIOUS ACTIVITY:** The Committee continues to play a leadership role in aligning and coordinating food security initiatives in the West Island.
- **EXPLORING ALTERNATIVES**: We are building from the ground up with Pointe-Claire residents, alternatives to food insecurity by improving access to fresh produce.




VISION

Adequate and appropriate affordable housing responding to the needs of citizens in the southern West Island in the next 50 years.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

The Housing Committee continued to meet regularly throughout the year through a virtual platform. These meetings allowed members to keep in touch with each other, to stay up to date on housing issues and provide feedback on ongoing projects. The PIC initiative, Housing for All, was a major focus for the committee, with members supporting the development of the project and participating in its events. The committee also learned about alternative affordable housing models, including community land trusts and affordable real estate investment strategies.





Housing Tours

Since 2019, committee members have sought to develop their own expertise on community housing by planning and going on internal housing tours. The housing tour model was granted funding by the Société d'habitation du Québec (SHQ) in late 2019 in order to provide this opportunity to the community and key stakeholders. Despite a strong demand for community housing, misconception, stigma and knowledge gaps often impede the development of these projects. In order to address this, the project Made in the West Island: A Community Housing Showcase, housing tours event, was developed. The event had to be adapted to the reality of an ongoing pandemic, with in-person tours replaced by virtual tours in a format of an individual documentary covering three community hosing projects.



This dynamic virtual event features expert presentations, original short films, and guided discussions. The event aims to attract attention of elected officials, community groups, housing professionals, residents, and other stakeholders. The films each showcase a community housing project in the West Island, featuring interviews with directors, staff, residents, and elected officials. The screening is scheduled to take place on May 18th, 2021.




Affordable Infill Workshops

The TQSOI and its Housing Committee aims to increase the affordable housing stock in the southern West Island. However, we cannot do this alone. Partnerships and the engagement of local leaders are essential to achieving this objective, including elected officials.

In 2020, the TQSOI received funding from the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) to raise awareness among elected officials and other stakeholders on issues related to affordable infill housing. Infill housing is the insertion of additional housing units into an established neighbourhood, which is particularly suited to the West Island suburban landscape, and a critical component of suburban municipalities advancing their long-term social and environmental goals.

The Bringing Affordability to the Suburbs project will feature 4 online workshops covering topics such as suburban densification strategies, greyfield redevelopment, adaptive building reuse, and accessory dwelling units (ADUs). Experts from Vivre en Ville. Arpent, and CMHC will be joining the workshops as guest presenters, with more to come!





Housing Advocacy

Beyond these events, we continue to advocate for affordable housing at multiple levels, including the municipal, provincial and federal levels. Particularly in Sainte-Anne-de-Belleuve, within the context of the development of the Anciens-Combattants site and the inclusion of an affordable housing project.

In September 2020, with our partner Bâtir son quartier and Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue director general, we held a presentation with the objective to bring together members of the community interested in learning more about the opportunity to take on a community housing project. Information was presented on the development of the Anciens-Combattants site and on the community housing project itself, as well as what it means to lead such a project in terms of role and responsibility and the support that the technical resource group Bâtir son quartier provides. Ultimately, the goal was to identify one or some potential groups to take on the project. This is currently on hold, as we work with our community partners to ensure that the funding and municipal support for the project endures.



Comité logement

The COVID-19 pandemic, combined with our current housing crisis, has increased the fragility of West Island tenant households. Their housing needs and concerns needed to be addressed. However, the West Island does not have a tenant's rights and support organization, known as a comité logement, specialized in providing information and support to tenants when they face situations such as evictions, unfair rent increase or poor living conditions.



In 2020, the TQSOI produced a feasibility study for a West Island comité logement. With this in hand, we applied to the Community Housing Transformation Centre to fund the establishment process for a comité logement in our territory. The goal of this project is to create a resource in the West Island to inform tenants of their housing rights and responsibilities, support them in the defense of their rights and raise awareness and advocate for policy change on their behalf. Our application was a success and the 3-year project will launch its first phase in May 2021:

- The first phase consists of building internal capacity, informing and engaging the community around the project using various communication tools and events.
- The second phase will bring these actors and other key stakeholders together to develop the foundation to establish a comité logement.
- The final phase consists of building the comité logement into a long-term, sustainable and independent organization; this includes securing long-term mission funding.

The comité logement establishment process is designed to ensure the involvement of West Island tenants in every step of the establishment process.



LOOKING FORWARD

The Housing Committee is committed to finding diverse solutions and opportunities to address the affordable housing needs of West Island residents. With this in mind, the committee plans to:

- 1. Explore community-based affordable housing models and learn from others.
- 2. Support local emerging opportunities and initiatives.
- 3. Build multi-level capacity to address housing needs and issues, for residents, local groups, community organisations and elected officials.



IMPACT

- **RESOURCE BUILDING:** The approximately 22 000 tenants that make up the West Island do not have an organization to seek help from if their housing rights are being infringed upon. This year's work to secure funding for the establishment of a comité logement will allow us to build this resource to address this significant gap in service.
- **HIGHLIGHTING CAPACITY:** Whether it be recent or emerging projects, the West Island has community housing projects that demonstrate resourcefulness and leadership of the citizens and communities who came together to create housing for those in need. These are highlighted in our Housing Tours event and provide the community with knowledge on how to successfully build affordable housing projects and overcome the stigma associated with them.
- **EXPLORING ALTERNATIVES:** The housing sphere is complex and there isn't a single solution to address the need for affordable housing. In an effort to understand this complexity and explore a variety of solutions, the committee explored alternative models and approaches to the issue. Work was also done to present alternative solutions to elected officials in order to encourage leaders to commit to affordable housing.
- MORE RESOURCES, MOBILIZED FUNDING: In addition to an ongoing partnership with Centraide, the Committee secured funding for its housing projects with SHQ, CMHC and the Community Housing Transformation Centre.

HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE


VISION

Improved and timely access to health and social services for citizens in the southern West Island.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The committee members focused on pressing needs of isolated seniors in care facilities on the West Island and they were successful in encouraging a pilot project providing WIFI for all seniors in CHSLDs.

They also continued to engage with the West Island CIUSSS and assured constant presence of CIUSSS representatives at our health committee meetings. We are happy to have a constant presence of our local health authorities at our committee meetings. This allows us to efficiently communicate and deliver important information about health and social services directly from our committee members as well as from West Island residents.



Opportunities were explored to provide feedback from the community to the West Island CIUSSS.

A COVID-19 West Island Health Squad was set up.

HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

- Explore mental health support for community workers, staff and directors.
- Focus on senior population.
- Develop new ideas and programs, identify gaps in services and solutions.
- Explore how the use of technology can enhance health and wellbeing.
- Improve communications channels with the WI CIUSSS.
- Access to services by Anglophone population.



IMPACT

- **COLLETIVE ACTION:** Continued alignment of COVID-19 raising awareness activities.
- MORE RESOURCES, MOBILIZED FUNDING: Collaborated with the WI CIUSSS and Fondation Philanthropique as well as local community organizations on the local COVID-19 awareness action plan, assured funding distribution to partner organizations.
- **COLLABORATION & PARTNERSHIP:** We connected our partnership with the West Island CIUSSS.



VISION

A concerted COVID-19 action plan is a practical and operational tool for organizing the community response to the pandemic. Based on the World Health Organization (WHO) model of "strengthening preparedness and support in the response to COVID", this action plan aims at curbing the transmission of the disease, reduce mortality related to COVID-19 and support the Government of Quebec's vaccination campaign in the territory covered.

In the summer of 2020, a consortium of philanthropic foundations began supporting community action plans to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in Quebec. The first phase of funding demonstrated the strength of the mobilization of Quebec communities to deal with the pandemic. The second phase of funding began while Quebec was still grappling with the second wave of the pandemic, noticing that community transmission rates remain high and that deaths outside of health facilities are more numerous than in the first wave.



However, vaccination is now upon us.

Building on recent learning,
new action plans are funded
to empower communities to play an
important role in supporting the population
in the coming months which will be crucial to
contain the pandemic and attain community immunity.

ACTION PLAN: COVID-19 WEST ISLAND

For West Island, the project trust is provided by the Table de Quartier Sud de l'Ouest-de-Île, TQSOI. A monitoring committee meeting every two weeks is made up of the various partners involved in the project: project coordination, the Table de Quartier Sud de l'Ouest-de-Île, TQSOI; the West Island CIUSSS; the West Island Community Resource Center, CRC; West Island Civic Advocacy, WICA; West Island Youth Action, AJOI; West Island Volunteer Accompaniment Service, ABOVAS; the Cloverdale Cooperative; the Borough of Pierrefonds-Roxboro and the City of Dollard-des-Ormeaux; Covid Quebec Fund project manager; Red Cross Canada.

The main objectives of the West Island Action Plan Project are to support the CIUSSS vaccination campaign in West Island, to curb the community spread of the COVID-19 virus and to offer support to people in the community who are at high risk of death from COVID-19.



In order to facilitate its development and implementation, the action plan retains 4 areas of practical intervention:

- 1. Coordination;
- 2. Awareness, communication and mobilisation;
- 3. Support for testing and vaccination;
- 4. Support for seniors, people at risk and people with COVID-19.



MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

The project was launched successfully, with the outreach agents forming the West Island Health Squad. The team underwent intensive hands-on training sessions with experts from West Island CIUSSS, the Red Cross as well as from their colleagues in Lasalle with whom they had the chance to work and benefit from their experience in the field.

The West Island Health Squad already helped with the organisation of several walk-in vaccination clinics in Pierrefonds, Dollard-des-Ormeaux, Sainte Genevieve and even in Lasalle and has started the outreach field work during which the agents were able to fill in almost 4,000 questionnaires in areas pinned as vulnerable by West Island CIUSSS and to distribute pamphlets with the resources available to the West Island population in need. As part of the awareness campaign, a Facebook page and an Instagram account were created, and more projects are foreseen to mark the presence of West Island Health Squad on social media as well.






NEXT STEPS

Among the planned activities for the summer of 2021, we want to mention the continuation of the door-to-door activities in vulnerable areas, school and summer camps awareness, and outreach activities in the parks and other summer local events.

The West Island Health Squad will also continue to assist the CIUSS in any other community based mobile clinics.

An awareness video, art related activities as well as other outreach projects are foreseen to mark the presence of West Island Health Squad.






VISION

Improve the quality of life of disadvantaged individuals and groups in the southern West Island.

ACTION PLAN: PROGRESS

Despite COVID-19 circumstances, the committee kept tight relationships, checked-in on a monthly basis and furthered it's yearly objectives with brio! We tested new communication platforms and tools (to keep our committee as inclusive as possible for all) and meeting frequency was adjusted to our new context. We also welcomed 7 new members representing a variety of community organisations, for a grand total of 17 members! Heading strong into 2020 the committee had a clear focus: **identifying and reducing gaps in West Island services**.

- Identify gaps in West Island services
 - The first action in that direction was to set up a survey to collect information on people's knowledge and use of local services, including their opinion on what's missing in their community. Then, the committee met with the CRC to learn more about what type of phone calls they receive and for which referral is a challenge. See the visual below which came out of these steps.
- Supporting the West Island community closing gaps in services
 - In parallel to our identification effort, the 2 other missions: committee took on better understanding developing a volunteer recruitment as a means to help working reduce gaps and the communication of existing services as a means to promote local resources and better inform the population of their existence.





COVID-19

GAPS ASSESSMENT THROUGH COVID-19

The TQSOI, in collaboration with the CRC and the YMCA Ouest-de-l'île took on the mission of collecting statistics about what community organisations were going through in the spring of 2020. A survey was set up and a series of four vignettes known as the "Snapshot of our West Island Community Heros" were used to highlight their accomplishments.



The activity was renewed in the spring of 2021, as the committee validated the data presented above with community members at TQSOI's membership meeting. Organisations' representatives were then invited to share what they hear from their clients and gaps they identify since the beginning of COVID-19.



THE "LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOURS" INITIATIVE

After the original launch of the Facebook page, the mutual aid facebook group (with close to 450 followers!) and the first "Top 10 ways to love your West Island Neighbours during COVID-19", the Love Your Neighbours initiative didn't take a break. This newsletter provides an overview of all the material produced to encourage west islanders to love their neighbors.



Also, in order to further support our community through this difficult time, the leader of the initiative - the West Island Network and it's collaborators - TQSOI and Hear Quebec - developed and implemented a series of actions:

- A weekly social media feature of the Top 10 ways, as an incitative for the community to participate.
- 147 porch visits conducted in Pierrefonds with a group of volunteers, in order to help break isolation and inform people about local services.
- A new and revised "Top 10 ways to love your West Island Neighbours during COVID-19" came out in October.







EVALUATION OF IMPACTS

As said by committee members, this year,


- We are most **proud** of: our ability to keep meeting and come up with our action plan, our survey and Love Your Neighbors initiative even through the pandemic.
- Our **strengths** were: contributing to social change, seeing impacts of our committee's work on our clients, making resources available and known, promoting autonomy for clients and breaking isolation
- The **roles** we saw ourselves in were: being active, motivated and committed members, with different levels of participation. We form a community.
- We **want** to: align our ambitions with concrete objectives to accomplish in the next 6 months with more actions, clarify our communication plan and better utilize the available resources in our community.





LOOKING FORWARD

Last year the committee worked and re-worked their action plan to create and put in place a direction and work steps for their yearly objective. This year, the committee will be able to further advance their work on gaps identification and supporting their bridging, through small task forces with clear focus and concise actions. Here's a sneak peek into our ongoing actions.



IMPACT

- **COLLABORATION & PARTNERSHIP**: We played a crucial role in supporting innovative local solutions to help alleviate social isolation.
- **UNIFYING LEADERSHIP**: The committee took on a challenging mission and turned it into concrete initiatives.
- **IDENTIFYING THE WEST ISLAND REALITIES**: Through surveys and concertation spaces the committee helped our community better understand its needs and gaps.

VISION

West Island collective Impact Project (PIC) is learning to work together by developing structured collective projects.

The TQSOI has been leading the West Island Collective Impact Project (PIC) since 2016 in collaboration with the CRC. PIC aims to bring community partners together to join forces and accelerate change in the fight against poverty.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS OF 2020-2021

Support and implementation of collective efforts:

- West Island steering committee: developing a new concertation structure for social development on the territory;
- Strategic support for the Table Enfance Famille Jeunesse de l'Ouest-de-l'Île and the regroupements en Petite Enfance de l'Ouest-de-l'Île (Grandir Ensemble et Familles 1 2 3 Go!);
- Strategic planning facilitation for the West Island Mental Health table;
- Support to the new West Island 'cellule d'intervention' for food security;
- And much more!

Collective training opportunities:

- 7 official virtual training sessions on various subjects offered to community partners;
- Continued updates of the "concertation" system diagram in the West-Island and presentations offered on 3 occasions;
- Publication of a new newsletter on training opportunities for the community sector.

Improving the efficiency of our collective communications:

- Continued development of the "West Island HUB", a centralized communication platform for the West Island community sector.
- Publication of a new community sector newsletter.

Housing dossier:

- Transition of the PIC housing dossier from the CRC to the TQSOI.
- New pilot-project with Comité logement St-Laurent to support West Island residents.
- Design & implementation of the collective action plan for housing including: research, development of new tools, webinars, workshops and more.

Housing dossier

The vision of PIC: Housing for All is to bring together a wide variety of key players in the community who together create innovative and realistic solutions to support affordable housing on the West Island. The targeted outcome is to develop several strategies (prototypes) to address affordable housing issues in the territory. The strategies identified for this lab will be developed based on the actual challenges of the West Island community.

Action Plan: Progress and Accomplishments

PIC: Housing for All is rooted in the foundations of the Design Thinking method. Unlike conventional ways of thinking, Design Thinking is a method of problem-solving that is non-linear yet structured, and encourages iterative loops of thinking geared toward action. This entails the following 5 steps: empathize, define, ideate, prototype, and test. Housing for All's phases are focused on the people and stakeholders confronted with the housing problem and those that can contribute to implementing solutions. The proposed course of action aims to develop three solution prototypes, as there is no single solution to address the challenges of affordable housing in the West Island.

Beginning in March 2020, Phase 1 included empathizing and defining resident housing and to develop a shared platform in the shape of website to outreach across the West Island. Our Housing Stories initiative shed light on many West Island residents' housing situations by learning their stories. The initiative followed, engaged, and immersed residents and local stakeholders in the issues of housing affordability in the West Island.

October 2020 saw the completion of our West Island stakeholders maps. The infographics were created to document the key stakeholders and their relationship in the context of affordable housing. To keep our project moving forward towards success, the design of our



stakeholders map continuously gave the team important information about everyone involved. Building an understanding and relationship with stakeholders was integral to our design thinking process.

Also in October 2020, Phase 2 began by deepening our knowledge of affordable housing development in the West Island. This included the creation of the website and monthly newsletter which together unpacked our discovery findings into housing needs, insights, and scope. Based on our understanding of residents and their housing environments, we came up with an actionable problem statement: **Housing for All.**

Over two weeks in November 2020, we hosted three online webinars on the topics of Housing & Health, Housing & Politics, and Housing & Inequality, and we welcomed over 90 attendees. The Housing & webinars featured a diverse group of local experts across 6 different community organizations who engaged on these topics and collectively shared their experiences and knowledge. Together, we explored the immeasurable impact that health, politics, and inequality have on housing.

In early 2021, we analyzed the results from Phase 2 in the form of the Idea Workshop. This analysis resulted in creating teams around popular ideas found to be ideal for prototyping solutions to affordable housing in the West Island. In March 2021, as part of Phase 3, the TQSOI hosted a series of workshops designed to choose community-sourced ideas aimed at addressing the issue of housing unaffordability. Participants had the opportunity to collectively discuss these ideas from different perspectives, and collaboratively select and prioritize which ideas were most likely to succeed. The co-created ideas will be prototyped and tested together as solutions to directly contribute to solving the housing crisis that is impacting all West Island residents.











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Looking Forward

Our next steps take place in Phase 4, where we will form interdisciplinary work teams around three prototypes to be developed and to accompany these teams in the development of their prototype that can be tested quickly.

The three prototypes are:

- 1. Tenant rights information sessions with material in multiple languages;
- 2. Support the supply of emergency housing for residents in vulnerable situations and
- 3. Help municipalities enable affordable housing

Phase 5, the last phase, intends to document the process, in a spirit of continuous knowledge transfer, to the participants themselves, but also to the community at large. The idea is to produce knowledge transfer tools for future affordable housing strategies.

Impact

PIC: Housing for All facilitated and empowered the West Island community in creating innovative affordable housing solutions that are suitable for the regional context. Through our platforms, residents and local stakeholders shared their knowledge of the current problems, which stimulated brainstorming. With over 120 participants, our webinars and workshops led the community in co-creating solutions for more diverse housing opportunities in the West Island. Each step of the process aimed to encourage active contribution of various community actors by inviting them to engage in the proposal and the actualization of solutions. This ultimately taught the West Island community to collaborate in a more productive and beneficial way, and continues to effectively develop structured housing projects.




















VIRTUAL EVENTS

EARTH DAY 2021 CELEBRATION

The TQSOI celebrated Earth Day with an event and a contest! The event Make Every Tree Count: Celebrating Citizen-Led Conservation provided participants with the opportunity to learn about the work the West Island community has done to protect our trees and they can, too. We heard directly from local environmental activists involved in the protection of West Island green spaces, including Anse-à-l'Orme and Angell Woods. The event also featured a tree identification workshop hosted by UrbaNature during which we learned about tree identification basics and collectively identified trees from pictures submitted by participants through our **Tree!** The contest invited contest, Adopt Α participants to get to know the trees in your neighbourhood a little bit better. Participants were asked to take a picture of a tree that brings them joy, try to identify it and send us their entry for a chance to win a gift certificate to a local nursery. We received wonderful submissions and touching stories about people's connection to their tree.


NEWSLETTER


